### Guideline: Neonatal resuscitation

While adult resuscitation guidelines have moved to CAB, neonatal resuscitation still follows the ABCs because most neonates who need resuscitation require airway and breathing support, and less often circulatory support.

### 2019 American Heart Association Focused Update on Neonatal ...

The Neonatal Resuscitation ILCOR and Guidelines Task Forces continue to support use of a 3:1 ratio of compressions to ventilation, with 90 compressions and 30 breaths to achieve approximately 120 events per minute to maximize ventilation at an achievable rate 173-178 (Class IIa, LOE C-LD). Thus, each event will be allotted approximately a half of a second, with exhalation occurring during the first compression after each ventilation.

BACKGROUND: Current neonatal resuscitation guidelines recommend using visual assessment of chest wall movements to guide the choice of inflating pressure during positive pressure ventilation (PPV) in the delivery room. The accuracy of this assessment has not been tested.

### Personnel capable of initiating resuscitation should attend every delivery. A minority (fewer than 10%) of newly born infants require active resuscitative interventions to establish a vigorous cry or regular respirations, maintain a heart rate >100 beats per minute (bpm), and achieve good color and tone.

### Part 11: Neonatal Resuscitation | Circulation

For preterm newborns ≤ 32 weeks' gestation, resuscitation should be initiated at 21%-40% oxygen concentration. For newborns ≥ 33 weeks' gestation, resuscitation should be initiated at 21% oxygen. Supplemental oxygen should be titrated as per guidelines based on the preductal oxygen saturation (SpO2) (Fig. 1).

### Guidelines - Resuscitation Council (UK)
